To develop, test and implement a quality assurance framework to support self-evaluation of Appropriate Adult services in Scotland.

Why is the change required? (e.g. legislative, routine review-)

Legislative – new statutory service enabled by Criminal Justice (Scotland) Act 2016, Section 100

What outcomes do you want to achieve?

Routine self-evaluation by local authorities resulting in national consistency and on-going improvement.

What barriers are there to achieving these outcomes?

Current infrastructure for management and oversight of these services.

Who is the policy, going to benefit and how? (and who, therefore, doesn't and why?) It will benefit local authorities; agencies commissioned to provide Appropriate Adult services; Police Scotland as the main customer; local Appropriate Adult co-ordinators; Appropriate Adults and people who need to use these services. It should also benefit the wider criminal justice system.

It will not benefit anyone in contact with the criminal justice system who does not have a recognised "mental disorder" and/or related communication needs.

When is the change due to be implemented?

The Criminal Justice (Scotland) Act 2016 has been enacted and guidance for local authorities was issued by Scottish Government in January 2020.

Following a Covid-19 related delay, work on developing the self-evaluation began in September 2020.

4. How will the policy/measure contribute to the wellbeing of children and young people in Scotland?

Outline how the implementation of the policy/measure will support public bodies in Scotland to meet their duties to safeguard, support and promote the wellbeing of children in their area, with wellbeing defined by eight wellbeing indicators. The development and implementation of a self-evaluation framework for Appropriate Adult services will provide local authorities with an evidence base for the quality of these services and therefore identify practice strengths and areas requiring improvement. Apart from the data provided in the Scottish Appropriate Adult Network annual reports, there are currently no nationally recognised quality indicators used to measure and report on the quality of Appropriate Adult services.

5. How will the policy/measure give better or further effect to the implementation of the UNCRC in Scotland?

This will inform Scottish Ministers' duty to report to Parliament on children's rights under the Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014

Use of the self-evaluation framework and the gathering of evidence around service performance will seek to provide assurance on whether the rights of individuals requiring an Appropriate Adult service are being upheld.

6. Have you involved children and young people in the development of the policy/measure?

We will engage and consult with people with lived experience of Appropriate Adult services to develop the self-evaluation framework. On-going canvassing of the views of people using services will be required once the self-evaluation framework is in use by local authorities. This will involve young people age 16+ as appropriate.

Age	Violent crimes involved people from a range of age groups, but only 14% involved any individuals aged 40 or over, suggesting that perpetrators tend to be from younger cohorts. Whilst property crimes were committed by people from a range of age categories, only 21% of incidents were noted as having involved individuals aged 40 or over. There is very little data available around the delivery of Appropriate Adult services in Scotland. Annual reports produced by the Scottish Appropriate Adults Network are limited in the information provided. The report of 2018/19 indicated that most individuals who used an Appropriate Adult service were in the main white males with a learning disability. There is currently no quality assurance or performance data published by individual local authorities.

Is further research necessary?

Once the self-evaluation framework for Appropriate Adult services has been developed and implemented, it is likely that more data will be available and reported by individual local authorities as they have the statutory responsibility for the provision of Appropriate Adult services.
